NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

At the Meeting on Monday 27th October the Parish Council received a presentation about

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Neighbourhood Plans from John Heselwood of Cheshire Community Action. This organisation is working with 22 local parish groups who are in the process of producing a Neighbourhood Plan.

А Neighbourhood Plan, once formally approved, becomes part of the planning decision process and has to be taken into account when planning decisions are made. It must 'generally conform' to the Local Plan that the planning authority, in Tarvin's case, Cheshire West and Chester Council, produces. Tattenhall recently became one of the first local areas to be covered by such a plan, though onlv after a High Court challenge bv developers.

A Neighbourhood Plan must be based on sound evidence and it is the collecting, analysing and professional presenting of this evidence that takes time, usually between 18/24 months. Though the Parish Council must legally take the lead, the work is done by a broad range of volunteers from the Parish. No formal qualifications are needed but volunteers who may have planning, statistical, I.T. or environmental experience can make the process run more efficiently.

Funding for the production of the plan, which costs about £7,000, is unlikely to be available until April 2015 so the Parish Council still has time to decide if and when it should go ahead.

The Council is very keen to hear from anyone who lives or works in the Parish who would be interested in joining a Steering Group to look more closely at the issue, with a view to starting the process. The decision to go ahead will partly depend on the level of local support.


TARVIN CONSERVATION AREA

Tarvin Village centre was designated as a Conservation Area in 1973. Conservation Areas are designated to protect places of significance and tighter planning controls exist within these areas. A map showing the extent of our Conservation Area can be viewed on the Parish Council website www.tarvinparishcouncil.org.uk along with guidance notes for property owners in the Conservation Area.

If you own or occupy a property in the Conservation Area, including commercial premises, and you wish to make alterations the Parish Council recommends that, before commencing work, you consult Cheshire West and Chester Council's Planning Department where you will get a sympathetic hearing and possibly save yourself time and money in the future.

TARPORLEY ROAD SPEEDING CONSULTATION

Cheshire West and Chester Council is proposing to reduce the speed limit to 40 mph along Tarporley Road from the junction with the A51 to where the current speed limit begins at Gamul Place.

A speed limit assessment has been undertaken by the Borough Council in line with the Council's 'Setting Local Speed Limits Guidance'. The outcome of the assessment recommended a 40 mph speed limit to be appropriate and has full support from Cheshire Police.

Thank you to the many residents around the Tarporley Road area who took time to complete and return the consultation paper. 98% of the returned documents supported the proposal. Cheshire West and Chester Council will now implement the change in the very near future.

NEW SIGNAGE FOR THE VILLAGE

The Parish Council has been anxious to support local businesses by improving the road signs at the entrances to the village in order to encourage more people to use local shops. There are strict rules about what can be put on road signs, including what can be put on the 'brown' information signs.

After a period of lengthy but productive consultation with CW&C Highways Department it has been agreed that new signage incorporating brown 'church' and 'walk' symbols will be erected at the three entrances to the village, the A51/Tarporley Road junction and the A54 junctions at the High Street and Lower High Street. These two symbols are the only ones from the approved list that reflect what is available in Tarvin. Also to be added are three smaller, black and white signs road signs indicating that the village can offer petrol, food, drinks and accommodation. It is also hoped that the sign at the A51 junction can incorporate a Pool Bank Park symbol that will inform heavy vehicles approaching from the south that they should proceed to the roundabout and turn left rather than cut through the village.

The cost of the new signs will be approximately £2,600 and will be met by the Parish Council from money received from the New Homes Bonus.

TARVIN COMMUNITY CENTRE

Autumn sees an increase in activity at the Community Centre as a number of classes and clubs get going again after the summer break. There continues to be a wide range of activities available on a regular basis catering for the needs of all age groups from the very young to the more mature. The Family Film Nights have started again though the programme was interrupted by Halloween in October and by and unfortunate clash with a major school event in November. To make up for this, grown-ups will be able to enjoy David Tennant, Rosamund Pike and Billy Connolly in the comedy What We Did on our Holiday on November 28th and there will be a Children's Film Night and Party on December 19th.

To add to the mix there will be a folk concert – Bandersnatch – on November 15th, a Craft Fair in aid of the Ash-worth Time Bank on November 22nd, a Barn Dance for the Cubs and Scouts on November 28th and a family theatre show, The Snow Queen on December 6th. Plenty of events for everyone to enjoy!

January will see the return of the ever popular Village Quiz (see separate item). Please do think of getting together with some friends and entering a team, you don't have to be part of an organisation or club to take part.

Plans for renovations and improvements continue to progress, albeit slowly. Plans have been drawn up and costed and now the focus in on finding and approaching funding bodies to persuade them that we are a sensible, sustainable and worthy cause who will use their generosity wisely and well for the benefit of the village. As the population of the village grows there will be increased demand for time and space at the Community Centre, already there are more requests for slots than can be met. Getting the rear room developed into a usable and let able space is one of the priorities that the Committee wants to achieve as quickly as possible.

TRAFFIC SAFETY ISSUES

A51 Junction – After much discussion Highways have agreed to reduce the width of area used by vehicles turning right into the village to 3 metres in the hope that this will give vehicles turning right out of the village better sight-lines south along the busy road. It will be reassessed after a trial period.

Oscroft – A full speed assessment on all three roads into Oscroft, Cross Lanes, Willington Road and Shay Lane should be completed by the end of January 2015. This will provide the evidence on which improvements can be made.

1ST TARVIN CUBS ANNUAL REPORT

It's now almost 12 months since we brought Cubs back to Tarvin and in this short space of time we have achieved a full Cub Pack and we already have a waiting list.

The main aims of scouting are to have fun in a safe environment where children can develop their skills and learn new ones, whilst developing a caring and responsible attitude towards the world and its people.
